Reunion Schedule Is Firming Up

The sights and sounds of Washington, D.C. are spectacular so bring lots of comfortable shoes 'cuz you're going to need them. And REMEMBER THIS ... most of these places are FREE! You know, FREE; like in 'NO CHARGE; ... you just walk in and walk out; see what you want and move on down the road. What a great concept! I am extremely happy about returning to D.C. and hope you will be able to join us. The next couple of paragraphs contain the outline for you on what we are planning for Thursday through Sunday. You will readily see that this daily agenda gives you a good deal of free time to explore as you wish.

Thursday, the 2nd of September, will be Registration Day for most of us. Once you've made it through the paperwork and received your orientation folder, you will have most of the afternoon to spend as you wish. Go see some of the sights or just spend some time in the

Hospitality Room catching up with old friends and meeting some new. The Metro Subway is a good way to get around to many of the D.C. sights and our Hotel will provide free shuttle service to the nearest Metro station. At 7:00 pm we will have an informational meeting in the Hospitality Room that is designed to familiarize you with what's on tap for Friday through Sunday, let you in on any changes that have been made to our schedule and answer any questions you may have. The Association Annual Business Meeting will immediately follow the informational meeting. At that time, the ladies will have an opportunity to renew old acquaintances and forge new ones while the men conduct their business meeting, hold elections and address any other topics of interest to the Association. Please note that this format does not include any scheduled periods for individual troop meetings. That does not preclude any Troop from having a meeting at some time on Thursday afternoon. Headquarters Hotel Facts

Our selection of the Holiday Inn National Airport as our headquarters location is already testifying to the fact that we made the correct decision. Within the time that our 75-room block was opened to us, this Holiday Inn has already registered 30-plus room rentals. At that pace we should see the need for additional rooms in a very short period of time. So, if you’re still trying to find the time to make that reservation or you have some kind of uncertainty regarding your ability to attend, I have this suggestion for you. **MAKE** your reservations **NOW** ... before it becomes too late to do so. Our cutoff date for making reservations is August 17, 2010. If something of greater importance does get in your way, it’s always much easier to cancel a registration than find one. And, although this newly renovated hotel now offers a total of 280 rooms, we’ve already reserved 75 of them. Don’t take the chance of trying to register later. They may not have any of the remaining rooms available.

IMPORTANT: Don’t forget to make your reservations in the block reserved for the 2nd Squadron, 1st Cavalry Association or you may not get the discounted price of \$89.00 per night plus tax ... a total of \$98.12 each night. This is an extremely sweet deal when you stop to consider that these prices are within a \$5.00 bill of what we paid 10 years ago. And the parking is **FREE!!** This discounted room rate will apply for the three days before and two days after our reunion so you may want to consider extending your stay. If you’re not driving to Washington, you will find that our hotel is just a short distance from the Ronald Reagan International Airport and is serviced on the half-hour by Holiday Inn shuttle buses.

This facility is located at 2650 Jefferson Davis Highway in Arlington, Virginia; for those of us that must still advise our children, parents and other family members of where we’ll be or if you want to plug this information into your GPS. his wife of 40 years, Sharon, three daughters and five grandchildren.

"He always liked getting the Blackhawk Bulletin," noted Sharon in the notification letter mailed to his brothers-in-arms. Ron was one of the original 'boat people' that went to Vietnam aboard the troopship USS Nelson Walker. A Blackhawk forever, his affiliation with our Association was never in doubt and led his wife to send this message to his fellow troopers. "...I thought I would write this letter to you all", said Sharon. "Please take care of yourself," she said, in closing. "Ron always said (it was) Agent Orange."

His sister, Iona Masters, notified the Association recently "that my brother is finally at rest from the Viet Nam War." Armor & Cavalry on the Move

In July of 2009 I was pleasantly surprised to get an email message from MG George Harmeyer (Ret.) notifying the Association about future plans to move the Armor Center at Ft. Knox to a new home at Ft. Benning, Georgia. For those of us that had the opportunity to spend a day at Ft. Knox during our 1998 Blackhawk Reunion, you will remember the VIP treatment we received during our tour of the post and our dedication of the unit's memorial among those of other legendary armored outfits. The planning of our agenda was closely supervised by MG Harmeyer and he pulled out all the stops in making this particular day one that we would never forget.

Who among us will ever forget the dedication ceremony when our marker was unveiled by General Harmeyer's words of pride and respect? With the waning notes of the Post Band, the roar of the artillery salute, the precise movements of the Honor Guard and the heartfelt swelling of our breasts as the Bugler sounded Taps to conclude the program, we remembered and paid homage to those of our brothers who gave their all during those bloody, fearful days in-country. And we vowed to cherish their memories and their bravery for as long as we could draw breath. Surrounded by so many other monuments which had distinguished themselves in much the same way as the 2nd Squadron, 1st Cavalry, we could almost feel their touch of welcome to a place of prominence that we had earned; just as they had.

In 2005, however; the Base Realignment and Consolidation (BRAC) members dictated that the Armor Center and School would move to Ft. Benning in 2011, taking



all the U.S. Army's artifacts and collections with them. The only Armor to remain at Ft. Knox would be those specific pieces belonging to the Patton Museum. What to do with the vast number of remaining artifacts, armored vehicles and collections was also included in the BRAC summary. They would move their equipment to Georgia and, re-named as the National Armor and Cavalry Museum (NACM); would join the National Infantry Museum and Soldier Center already being established at Benning.

Recognizing the need to assist in this effort, the NACM was formed to raise an estimated \$42 million dollars, matching the amount of federal funds budgeted to BRAC in their move to Benning. An additional \$33 million dollars would consist of federal monies being used to construct a Climate Controlled Facility. Along with the re-structuring of the of the National Armor and

Cavalry Museum came the addition of the 'legalities' inherent in the term "Foundation". Its creation as an operating entity allowed the Foundation to take shelter under the nonprofit status of the United States Armor Association. This partnership will last until the NACMF is granted their own nonprofit status. Recently incorporated in the State of Georgia, the Foundation is expecting to win its own place under the nonprofit umbrella shortly.

And...Surprise, SURPRISE!! Our own MG George Harmeyer (Ret.) has accepted the role of Chairman and Chief Executive Officer. The Foundation's main objective is to aid in the "creation and support of a permanent home for the Armor and Cavalry traditions, archives and historical antiquities..." As noted above, the Foundation is charged with procuring \$42 million dollars towards this effort and General Harmeyer's words to me were a simple request to share this news with our membership. This will become a world class museum devoted to teaching and operating armor and cavalry. A few of us have already sent or designated donations to help in the Foundation's fund-raising efforts. If you would like to join us, please make your donation out to the 2/1 Cavalry Association and we will see that your non-taxable gift gets to the United States Armor Association.
